



# Building a Shared Data Future for Philanthropy

## About PDC

The Philanthropy Data Commons® (PDC) is a sector-wide initiative that connects the systems, organizations, and data that philanthropy runs on. It provides a shared infrastructure that allows funders, nonprofits, and the ecosystem partners they already use to share information on their own terms.

At its core, the PDC provides:

- An interoperable data model so information about organizations, grants, and funding flows can be understood across different systems.
- A consent-based framework that lets organizations share their data securely, only with the parties they choose and for the purposes they approve.
- Shared feedback mechanisms so the infrastructure serves the field rather than any single platform or vendor.

The PDC isn't a new platform to adopt. It's the connective layer that makes the tools you already use work together.

## Why this matters

Philanthropy generates an enormous amount of data about organizations, funding flows, and community needs. Yet much of that data remains siloed across systems, funders, and formats.

This creates real challenges:

- Nonprofits are asked to enter the same information again and again
- Funders make decisions without a full picture of where resources are going
- Coordination across organizations takes more time and effort than it should

The PDC is building toward a future where this work becomes simpler, more connected, and more transparent.

# Better Decisions. Faster Funding. Less Duplication.

Exchange is the PDC's first live application - a web-based tool designed to support more informed and coordinated funding decisions. Through Exchange:

- Funders can explore standardized grant proposal data by issue area, geography, or population served
- Identify potential co-funding opportunities
- Coordinate responses to emerging needs outside of formal grant cycles

At the same time, nonprofits gain visibility to aligned funders year-round - not just when a funding opportunity is open. The result is simple: both funders and nonprofits can move faster, with better information and less duplication. **Check out our [demos here](#).**
